For 24 years, Thea Foundation has been proud to recognize and reward students who demonstrate a talent and passion in the arts. What began as our inaugural program has grown into the cornerstone of our mission, awarding 36 scholarships across five categories, totaling \$219,000 annually.

Nearly 300 students from across Arkansas submitted work showcasing a wide range of talents, from vocal performance to filmmaking. The 36 scholarship recipients stood out not only for their skill but also for their interpretation of this year's theme, "Fluidity." Each winner brings a unique voice and vision, and we can't wait to see where their journeys take them next.

Every year, we witness how these scholarships open doors for students who might not have access to postsecondary opportunities. COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Thea's gallery serves as a vibrant space where we engage the community through a diverse range of student exhibitions, featured Art Department artists, and collaborations with community partners. When people come together in a creative environment, ideas flourish, barriers break down, and meaningful dialogue begins. Serving the community in this way has become as integral to our mission as supporting classrooms across Arkansas.

"Recently, there has been a great deal of debate over how our children should be educated, with traditional public schools under increasing pressure. In many cases, funding has shifted to charter schools or private school vouchers. As a result, I've focused on what I can directly impact: the students I see every day. I work with the kids assigned to my classes and give them as much as I can."

In April and May, we hosted The Creative Collective III, our largest and most diverse

exhibition of the year. Featuring over 80 works from Arts Reconstruction teachers and their students, this show highlighted not only the themes students grapple with daily but also the artistic skills they have developed through the program.

June's Art Department exhibit, Wish You Were Here!, showcased Adaja Cooper's deeply personal exploration of memory's fleeting nature. A graduate of Hendrix College and Little Rock Central High School—where she studied under former Art Department artist and Arts Reconstruction Windgate Fellow Rex DeLoney—Cooper's work resonates with both local and broader audiences.

Looking ahead, the Arkansas Pastel Society and Ozark Pastel Society will present their annual exhibition in July, featuring dozens of talented artists from across the state. In August, Arts Reconstruction Windgate Fellow Amber Cardinale will showcase her work, followed by Parkview Arts and Science Magnet High School teacher Windgate Fellow Matt TerAvest, who will close out the 2025 series.

ARTFULLY FUNDED THROUGH ART CLOSET

Thanks to the generous support of partners like Windgate Foundation, Clinton Family Foundation, Entergy Arkansas Foundation, Pulaski County Youth Services, Rebsamen Fund, U.S. Bank Foundation, and others, Thea Foundation has provided over \$3.1 million in creative supplies to public school classrooms across Arkansas. From simple requests for crayons and markers to more advanced tools like oil pastels, these materials breathe life into classrooms and empower teachers to offer meaningful, hands-on learning experiences.

Thea's Art Closet operates through a unique, community-leveraged funding model in partnership with DonorsChoose, an online platform where teachers request support for classroom projects beyond their school budgets. This direct-to-classroom approach makes a tangible difference in a state where arts funding remains extremely limited.

In the 2024–2025 school year alone, 300 projects were funded across 117 schools, supporting 190 teachers and reaching countless students.

While it's just one of our core initiatives, Thea's Art Closet offers our widest reach, connecting us to more classrooms than any other program. As we continue to see growing needs in schools across the state, we remain committed to expanding our impact from the current 16% of classrooms to all public school classrooms in Arkansas that need us.

CLASSROOM HIGHLIGHTS

Thea Foundation's generous donations have transformed my elementary art program. With a yearly budget of just \$250 to serve 400 students, resources have always been extremely limited. For years, I spent personal funds, worried about how to provide meaningful experiences, and saved every imaginable item in hopes of repurposing it for art. Discovering the Thea Foundation changed everything.

Thanks to their support, my students now have access to high-quality art supplies-paints, brushes, paper, clay, and more—that were previously out of reach. This variety allows them to explore different media, fueling creativity and deepening their engagement.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Amanda Miller, Melbourne Elementary

The funding has also expanded our curriculum. I've been able to introduce new techniques like printmaking, sculpture, and even digital art projects that spark interest in students who might not connect with traditional methods. It has opened doors for expression and learning that would otherwise remain closed.

In our low-income, rural community, these experiences are especially important. Many of my students have limited access to the arts outside of school. Thea Foundation's support helps level the playing field, providing opportunities that improve attendance, academic performance, social skills, and emotional well-being. Art has become a space where students feel joy, confidence, and

connection—and I'm no longer burdened by the fear of not being able to offer that.

Simply put, the Thea Foundation has empowered me to give my students the creative education they deserve.

MIDDLE SCHOOL

Bobbi Grandon, Green Forest Middle School

Art has become a powerful motivator in my classroom. My students are excited to complete their classwork so they can dive into creative projects—none more so than one particularly shy student who truly comes alive through art. Watching her move from one project to the next with confidence and enthusiasm has been a highlight of my year. The bond we've built through our shared love of art is deeply meaningful and transformative.

Art also fosters collaboration in my classroom Students naturally partner up based on shared interests and work together in a supportive, pressure-free environment. These experiences are helping them build essential life skills creativity, communication, and teamwork that will serve them far beyond the classroom.

Thea Foundation has played a critical role in making this possible. Their financial support has been essential-these projects simply wouldn't exist without it. But the impact goes far beyond supplies. For my students, many of whom speak different home languages, art is not just a creative outlet—it's a language of its own. It gives them a voice, a way to express themselves and a chance to show their learning and growth in ways that words sometimes cannot capture.

HIGH SCHOOL

Candice Hawkins, Manila High School Thea Foundation has played a vital role in

growing our theatre program at Manila High School. Just three years ago, we started with little more than a few costume tubs. Thanks to Thea's support—especially matching grants we now offer hands-on experiences in makeup, costume design, model building, and more. Their contributions have filled critical gaps with essentials like makeup kits, microphones, art supplies, and rehearsal snacks, allowing us to focus on teaching.

Our program has not only grown, it's thriving. Students are finding their place and their voice through the arts. One of our 8th-grade students has taken on the role of lighting technician with serious commitment, and his mother-who now volunteers regularly-says she's seen a dramatic positive change in him socially and emotionally.

Another student, a talented visual artist, stepped onto the stage for the first time and landed the lead in *The Outsiders*, continuing to blossom as a performer. We've also seen students who previously felt isolated begin to participate fully, make friends, and explore writing their own plays.

We are proud to offer these life-changing opportunities in Northeast Arkansas, despite our small 3A size and limited budget. My goal is to provide an experience on par with any large school in the state. That means ensuring access to the same quality equipment and opportunities-whether students pursue theatre careers, earn arts-based scholarships, or simply gain confidence and collaboration skills that serve them for life.

Support in the classroom means confidence. It means we can teach without fear-knowing our students have the resources they need to thrive. Thea Foundation has made that possible for us, and I'm truly grateful.

ARTS RECONSTRUCTION 2024/2025



Thea Foundation's Arts Reconstruction program is a targeted initiative designed to strengthen high school visual arts education by investing in both educators and their classrooms. Through peer-led professional development and capital support for new materials, teachers gain the skills and resources they need to elevate their curriculum and expand creative opportunities for students while building relationships with educators in our community.

Thanks to the continued support of Windgate Foundation, Arts Reconstruction has supported educators through ongoing programming, including The Creative Collective I, The Creative Collective II, and The Creative

Collective III. These exhibitions—featuring student and teacher artwork displayed side by side—have become a yearly highlight, showcasing the creativity, collaboration, and artistic growth made possible by the program.

In April and May 2025, the annual Creative Collective exhibit filled gallery walls with more than 100 dynamic works, ranging from 2-D compositions to 3-D installations. This year's showcase reflected the incredible dedication of our educators and the impact of their instruction on students across Central Arkansas.

The 2024/2025 Arts Reconstruction Windgate Fellows represented a vibrant cross-section of the region, including educators from Little Rock Central, Conway, Joe T. Robinson, Parkview Arts and Science Magnet, Bryant, Maumelle, and North Little Rock High Schools. Many of the student pieces featured were also recognized through Thea Scholarships or honored at the Arkansas Young Artist Association competition, proof that empowered teachers can create powerful ripple effects far beyond the classroom.

ARTS RECONSTRUCTION IMPACT

Sara Brannen, Arts Reconstruction Alum

"When I first heard about the Arts Reconstruction program with Thea Foundation, I thought this is probably one of those really great summer intensives for teachers that I will have to come up with funding for. But it turned out to be just as incredible as the amazing scholarships they offer students and the help that they provide with Thea's Art Closet.

After meeting with Nick at a local coffee shop to discuss the Arts Reconstruction program, I was amazed at what would be offered to my students and myself as an educator. While in the program, Thea funded all of the materials to share new mediums with our students that kept art relevant and exciting. I learned together with other educators and through teaching my students how to do coldconnection metals, phone photography, wood transfers, new ceramic techniques, silk painting, fabric dyeing, cyanotypes, and papermaking. With all of the materials and new knowledge, I was able to share that with the other art teachers at my school, Sylvan Hills. It also opened up the opportunity for collaborative chemistry lessons with our wonderful chemistry teacher, Mr. Johnson.

In 2020, I left the state of Arkansas for Washington State and got a job in Portland, Oregon, where I currently teach as the only high school art teacher in my district. While I have been here, I have kept in touch with some of the teachers from the program as well as a few of my former students, one of them being Charles Johnson.

Charles was an incredible art student in high school and spent countless hours in and out of school on his art projects. He participated with his metals and bookbinding project in the Governor's Competition as well as AYAA. He decided upon graduation that he wanted to change the education system and advocate for the arts. He graduated from UCA to become an art teacher at Conway High School in 2023. I instantly thought, as a first-year art

teacher, Thea Foundation could do so much for whatever art program was lucky enough to have Charles as an educator. I reached out on his behalf to foster that connection. and I am not surprised that he has taken advantage of the incredible opportunity that Thea provides for art programs across the state. He has shared that he has learned a lot, and being part of the Arts Reconstruction program has also been an exciting venture. He even shared a technique with me that I was unfamiliar with—carborundum prints. I know as he continues with the program and earns his graduate degree, he will do amazing things and hopefully continue connecting fellow art teachers with Thea Foundation programs.

Although I am now teaching in Oregon at Parkrose High School, I have used some of the techniques and tools that I learned to share with the students here such as the mobile photography and wood transfer techniques. We have also done some of the ceramic lessons and I am hopeful one day we can fund papermaking and metals. I wish that Thea Foundation was a nationwide program because it is invaluable and truly needed to help promote student creativity and problem-solving, to create empathetic connections in society, and to give students joy and confidence in school to prepare them for the future. It was also such an incredible opportunity to meet with other artists and art teachers. I will always look back at my time working with Thea fondly and with deep gratitude."
